Keynote Presentation Theme: DG Penny Offer focused on the RI theme for this year, 'Building Communities, Bridging Continents'. She underscored Rotary as the best global organization at linking people, Rotary's mission to make the world a better place through the efforts of like minded people and how the power of one person acting with passion can fuel the power of many.



one person acting with passion can fuel the power of many. DG Penny's dream is for Rotary to be 'Bigger', 'Better', 'Bolder'. She noted inspirational comments from world class leaders. Walt Disney - 'If you can dream it, you can do it'. John Furlong - 'Impossible is just a word, a distraction'. Margaret Mead - 'A small group of like minded individuals can change the world. In fact it is the only thing that can'. She mentioned her interest in literacy projects, noting that if you educate a boy you educate an individual, but if you educate a girl you educate a community. The mission of polio eradication was also emphasized. A campaign 'Pennies for Polio' has started and President David Spears accepted the challenge of our Club beating the target. DG Penny pointed out that it only costs about \$.60 for a polio vaccination and that we are winning the fight against polio, with help from the Gates foundation donation of \$355 million and

the RI pledge of \$200 million. DG Penny ended by introducing President David Spears as the latest inductee onto an elite team - 'Penny's Posse'. This tradition flows from 'Bob's Bandits' two years ago. Does that mean President

David will now show up in boots, spurs, cowboy hat and six guns, singing Wild West songs, chewing tobacco, cussing and threatening to run varmints out of town? An idea for a theme night?

Following her address, our exchange student Tan made his own presentation to DG Penny.



Thanks to Speaker: President David thanked DG Penny Offer and presented her with our coveted certificate, that promises to immunize twenty children against Polio, with the intent of eradication of polio.
