Presenter: David Spears introduced our guest speaker, Paul Butler from Hollyburn Family Services. Paul has spent twenty years working with 'at risk' youth, is a coordinator of the Hollyburn Life Success and North Shore Youth Safe House programs and is a foster parent.

Paul started with a very sincere thank you to Rotary and our club for its contributions of time and money towards the North Shore Youth Safe House, most recently through proceeds from the joint club Wine and Food Festival. Paul

mentioned that there has been a 38% increase in homeless youth on the North Shore over the last few years and that 720 youth have gone through the doors of the North Shore Youth Safe House. The house is at capacity and last year had to turn away 200 youth. The increase in homeless youth is largely being attributed to housing affordability on the North Shore. These youth have often grown up on the North Shore and want to continue to live and work in their community. Paul went on to explain the purpose of the Life Success Program. The program targets 18 to 24 year olds who, because of the economic realities today, need more time to get on their feet compared to generations past. There is one house established for girls/women and one for boys/men. A legacy fund has been created to help develop self-esteem and skills for these young people to move forward, including a 16 week employment program.

The goal is to break the cycle of homelessness. A challenge is that the current North Shore Youth Safe House contract with the Federal Government (Service Canada) expires in March 2014. There is uncertainty as to whether funding will be renewed and the Safe House kept open. Service Canada presently funds 82% of the Safe House's operational budget. Going forward the Feds would like to see their funding matched by a combination of private funding and Provincial Government funding.

Paul ended with a thank you to Rotary for its continuing support in helping to create a sustainable program to eradicate homelessness on the North Shore.

Thanks to Speaker: John Ward thanked Paul and presented him with our highly coveted certificate that promises to immunize twenty children against Polio, with the intent of eradication of Polio. As a member of the Canada Day Parade committee, John promised to vote for \$4000, of the available \$12,000, to be donated by the committee to the North Shore Youth Safe. The Canada Day Parade committee is unfortunately being disbanded.



Toast to Rotary International: President Wendy led the group in toasting Rotary International.

The 4-Way Test: President Wendy led the group in the 4-Way Test and then, hearing nothing more for the good of Rotary, adjourned the meeting.
