Ed Meyer explained that he is an electrical engineer, worked with McDonald Dettwiler, and has a high-tech background with LED's and what they can do.

He says that LED's are more incredible than lasers. The Russians used LED's long before NASA, which is now the largest user.

It has been found that LED's help plants to grow faster and help injuries to heal (41% of servicemen returned to duty much faster than expected).

With the right frequency and colour, the LED promotes body cells to produce ATP and nitrous oxide (N-O) that heals the body. This will open up more blood vessels, more oxygen is transported to cells, and blood pressure is reduced. Most bodily functions depend on N-O. Without it you would have excruciating pain.

The colours of the LED to promote healing are: Near-infrared, which penetrates the deepest into the body; Red, which penetrates up to 4 inches; and Blue, which penetrates near the surface. Treatments are for pain relief, mobility, speed healing (reduces inflammation), skin and bone maladies, body sculpturing and anti-aging. It



is new to Canada and has been is the U.S. for some time. The technology is safe and cool to the body (near infrared produces some heat). The mask used to apply the treatment is soothing and tends towards making you fall asleep.

Rolf Gillardon thanked the speakers, and presented the coveted "immunization certificate".
