Happy and Sads: A few happy and sads were expressed. Many happies were for Daniel in honour of his being President-Elect. Sergeant-at Arms Michael circulated a recent article in The Province about Colin McSween, a regular visiting Rotarian from Abbotsford, and his passion over details surrounding the death of President Kennedy 50 years ago this week.

Presenter:

Our speaker, Abbie Norrish of Covenant House Vancouver, was introduced by David Spears. Abbie has a Paul Harris Award courtesy of her grandfather, Jim Robinson, a long time member of the Campbell River Rotary Club. Abbie is a commerce graduate who very recently moved to Vancouver from the Okanagan to work in the not-for-profit sector as a community liaison officer for Covenant House Vancouver. This talk was her first test (which she performed to perfection).

Abbie spoke in glowing terms of the services to homeless young people Covenant House provides. Covenant House Vancouver is funded by donations. It is associated with the U.S. Covenant House organization and Covenant House Toronto. It services homeless youth who come to it. Vancouver has between 500 to 1,000 such youth each day. It has two shelters in downtown Vancouver with 54 beds for drop-ins and 25 rooms for transitional residents.



Covenant House has three main programs:

- A no charge drop-in centre with counselors, food services, showering facilities, and used clothing racks.
- A shelter for residents limited to three day stays.
- A "right of passage" residential program for youth entering into a Covenant Agreement negotiated with a youth worker.

It also has outreach counselors working in two person teams in the East side of downtown Vancouver.

The focus of all programs is to teach and train youth to learn life skills to live independently. Incremental change is often small and occurs over time. Homeless youth live alone because of poor or non-existent support from adults in their early years. The first step is to get them in the door and ask for help. Covenant House uses a safe and supportive approach building trust by responding to one basic need, then another. It takes care to keep its facilities free of bedbugs.

Abbie answered questions well past the program period. More information on Covenant House Vancouver, its volunteering programs, and fundraising and donations activities is available at its website.
