Program:

Our very own, and "very lucky", John Stuart was our speaker. John has an avid interest in the history of North Vancouver. His topic was the beginnings of the municipal water supply in the Lower Mainland. The first system was sourced from the headwaters of Lynn Creek in 1904.

Prior to 1904, logging was in full operation in the Seymour area of the North Shore because of its slope. The creeks were utilized for water for mill boilers. Flumes were constructed for moving cedar cut for shingles, logged after most fir had been harvested. The cedar was cut into 18 inch blocks and then floated down the flumes to Burrard Inlet for transport by sea to market. The water from the flumes was collected in rain barrels by Charles H. Cates, who sold the water to the ships in port. This entrepreneur founded Cates Tug.

In 1904 the oldest municipal water supply system was established with an intake at the 600 foot elevation mark in Lynn Creek, where Lynn Creek Road (formerly known as Pipeline Road) ends. The system was discontinued in the mid 1920's. The remnants of the intake and its replacement, complete with weirs or dams, is still visible from the footbridge just downstream on Lynn Creek.

John's presentation included drawings, pictures, and graphs explaining how the water entered the intake, how it was settled using settling tanks, and how debris was dealt with. On at least two occasions, the water level of Lynn Creek rose rapidly, flooding the intake up to 10 feet above the normal level.

John could have continued with the story of Ross Lake, but he had used his allotted time.

Thanks: Neil Creighton thanked John and presented him with the customary Polio Plus certificate whereby the club will, in John's name, immunize 20 children against polio.
